

New contractor begins works on Banff Harbour repairs

The following is the news release from Aberdeenshire Council, Banff Harbours

Works have resumed on vital repairs to Banff Harbour following the appointment of a new contractor.

Following the termination of the previous contract, Aberdeenshire Council is pleased to announce that Shearwater Marine Services Ltd are now on site to progress the project. The specialist company will initially be working on the East Pier to ensure its structural stability before winter. Work to complete the remainder of the repairs to the Railway Jetty and reinstate the masonry cladding to both the pier and jetty will then proceed.

Philip McKay, Head of Roads and Infrastructure, with responsibility for Harbours, said: "Shearwater have been undertaking dive surveys and inspections and are now mobilized on site, taking delivery of the materials and supplies required for this project much of which has been sourced locally.

"Perhaps most importantly, we have secured a supply of interlocking concrete blocks which, given a calm sea state, will enable Shearwater to create a new internal wall which will then be backfilled by the end of November."

"As this new approach will see the wall built up in layers, with each new additional layer it further strengthens the pier which is a very positive and we are investigating a form of temporary deck to stop any over-topping from washing it out.

"Moving forward, we are continuing our discussions with both Shearwater and other suppliers to look at the rebuilding of the stonework of both the East Pier and Railway Jetty and we will, of course, provide harbour users with updates in due course."

Navigation and other sailing tips.


Mark up for the crane driver

Do yourself a favour and mark your boat's lift points



How many times has a crane driver who doesn't know my boat asked me where I want the slings when he's about to lift her out? Next time you're successfully hauled, make a note in the back of the logbook of where the slings landed. This might be in relation to stanchions, rigging or any other immovable reference point. When the time comes around again for the crane, stick an inch or two of masking tape at the right spot. The driver will be grateful, and you won't end up with a bent prop shaft and heaven knows what else in the way of collateral damage.

Relieve the load



One of the ancient arts of the sailor is setting up a "stopper" to relieve a loaded rope without letting anything go. The classic use for a stopper is to take the weight off the genoa sheet when your crew has carelessly locked up the whole shooting match with an override.

A great solution is to used the stopper shown below It takes the load at the turning block while the override is sorted out winding the sheet in a few inches on another winch to relieve the force on the stopper. Once sorted, removed it and sail on. To create a stopper that works, clap on a half-hitch before the rolling hitch as shown. You can see it doing the work, and it guarantees success. If you can't tie a rolling hitch, go to a previous newsletter where it is explained and learn how. You may need it sooner than you think

Note that in the example above a half-hitch before the rolling hitch adds security to the system.
